



Tommy Douglas, Premier of Saskatchewan Introduced the continent's first single-payer, universal health care program, commonly known as Medicare in 1961.





Unemployment Action Centres across BC, run by local labour councils. The storefront operations were gathering places where unemployed workers could receive assistance or just a place to talk.




Unemployment Acton Centres also advocated for workers and were central to the 1983 Operation

THIS MONTH IN BC LABOUR HISTORY

- April 5, 1917 Coal Creek Mine Explosion kills 34 workers.
- April 6, 1980 Canadian Farmworkers Union founded
- April 13, 1903 Union organizer Frank Rogers shot during strike on
 Vancouver waterfront; he died two days later.
- April 28, 1902 Local 604 of Retail Clerks International Protective
 Association held its first meeting in Victoria
- April 28, 1991 First National Day of Mourning for workers killed or injured on the job.
